#### MEET THE TEAM

I recently attended Deanery Synod and we were addressed by Rev Canon Pamela Ive – Diocesan Director of Ordinands and Vocations (DDOV) for Rochester Diocese. She spoke about 'It's Your Calling' days and the many ways that we can serve the church including lay (congregation members being licensed by the diocese in many church roles), and ordained ministry, being a deacon, or priest like me. ## **GILL ROWE**

When I came to live in Hayes, in the early 2000s, and to worship at St. Mary's, Gill was already established as one of the two Readers, and also as Branch Leader of the Mothers' Union. I quickly realized she was comfortable in both roles. She had a certain presence, a confidence and togetherness which was perhaps due to her nursing background. And she had an easy manner in the pulpit, so that her uniquely personal, accessible sermons, and her light touch, were much appreciated by many in the congregation. Her leadership of the Mothers' Union was firm, yet relaxed, and assisted by her sense of humour. I remember too her support for any member who was struggling or unhappy.

Her pastoral concern led Gill to undertake training to conduct funerals, something I know she found deeply satisfying, and I also know that it was valued by those to whom she ministered. Gill found all her church work fulfilling, and it was inevitable that she would be reluctant to retire. She had often told us of how, when she had first visited St. Mary's, she had realised instantly that it was to become 'her' church, and it did become her second home. And she didn't of course leave it.

She continued to play an active part in church life, retained her friends, and set about organising coach trips for us all to enjoy. She would also offer lifts to everyone. Proud of her driving, and especially of her Advanced Driving Qualification, she would remind us of how young she'd been when she learned to drive, and of how much she enjoyed it. So when her cognitive powers began to fail, and her car was an early casualty, she was as disappointed, I think, as when she'd had to retire.

For some time a group of us had met Gill every Saturday for lunch at the New Inn, occasions she really enjoyed. As her mental capacity further deteriorated she coped with difficulties most of us would have found embarrassing and upsetting with composure, her unfailing good humour, and dignity, all of which endeared her to us all.

When she was established in the delightful care home her son Jonathan found for her, she remained calm and composed, and accepting. I missed her when she left Hayes, was fortunate enough to visit her two or three times in her new surroundings, but now that she is gone I miss her more.

## HAYES MEN'S FELLOWSHIP

August may be the main holiday month but, as we write these words ahead of printing deadlines in late July, we still have much to write about.

Here then are the usual reports on our recent activities starting with our varied outing to the Kent coast around Folkestone and Dover with 48 people on board the coach as we set off from Hayes. First stop was the recently opened Capel-le-Ferne Battle of Britain Memorial. It is situated in a beautiful cliff top setting overlooking the Channel and, if you go right to the edge, Folkestone below. The main gardens are circular and are marked out with what looks like a giant propeller with a memorial at its centre to each of the squadrons involved in the Battle of Britain.

There is also a separate memorial listing all those who died in the campaign. There are aircraft on display too, usually both a Spitfire and the Hurricane but also the opposition in the form of a "Stuka" dive bomber. A real treat while we were there was the sight and sound of two Spitfires flying over the site. They were accompanied by a more modern "chase" plane, probably filming the other two to record "Spitfire experience" flights. Views from the first floor café were stunning.

Next stop was Folkestone where we paused briefly to unload at the Harbour with its views of the White Cliffs round towards Dover. For most of the passengers Folkestone was a brief stop for lunch and a bit of browsing or shopping. It was interesting to note that Folkestone was becoming more trendy, with a number of creative businesses active in the town. There were lots of lunch opportunities there, with plenty of small local cafes as well as the ubiquitous and ever popular Wetherspoons.

For ten of the people on the coach, Folkestone was their main stop. This gave them plenty of time to explore the old town with its now brightly painted buildings, as well as visit the Fishing Museum near the harbour or the bigger Folkestone Museum in Guildhall Street.

Next stop after lunch for the majority was the Dover Transport Museum – the only transport museum in Kent. The unprepossessing buildings housed an array of classic and more modern vehicles, including a beautifully restored MG TC Coupe, a rare Austin Atlantic coupe and even the Mayor of Folkestone's former official car, a Rover 75. The cars were joined by a range of commercial vehicles too, including a lorry that saw service during WW1. Not only was there a substantial model railway layout, but outside there was a real steam locomotive - the St Thomas 0-

6-0 Saddle tank engine. Altogether there was plenty there to see and do. That included the Museum café which did a roaring trade in cream teas – not surprising at just £6 – and kindly stayed open for longer than normal so that we could have a final tea or coffee before heading home. We then had a relaxing drive back to Hayes, remembering to pick up the guests who spent more time in Folkestone en route. This was another varied outing with lots to see and learn about - again in the company of fellow HMF members and our guests and friends.

Our most recent walk was in the Keston area. Starting from Keston Village car park the four walkers followed paths across fields (one with a healthy broad bean crop) and through woods by the Wilberforce Oak and Keston Ponds. On the way, they met a young lady on a horse who kindly took their photograph. Near an emergency access gate to Biggin Hill airport, a local man told them about an incident during WW2 in which a Spitfire crash landed at that spot, throwing the pilot's body up into the nearby tree while the plane's engine skidded along the ground, crashed into the adjacent cottage and killed a lady inside. Repairs to the cottage brickwork are still evident. Shortly afterwards they saw a Spitfire approaching and landing on the runway. At the top of a hill they came to the Wilberforce Oak and then, via a short diversion, one of the walkers showed them the source of the Ravensbourne River, Caesar's Well at Keston Ponds. From the number of people they met, this 5.7 mile walk seems to have been quite sociable!

Our AGM, chaired by our President Rev'd Amanda Spence, went very smoothly and even featured a bit of audience participation, like last year. We always start with a series of reports on the previous year covering membership, finances and activities. All the reports were well received, with those presenting them receiving a good round of applause. The accounts were approved too, and the healthy state of the finances (thanks to our Treasurer) enabled the very modest annual subscription at £20 to be maintained for our new session starting in October. ### CLASSICAL GUITAR CONCERT

Mark also played a couple of arrangements of Johann Sebastian Bach, originally written for other instruments, and also a piece by Bach's contemporary Silvius Leopold Weiss, a German composer and lutenist. Both were Baroque composers and were indeed friends.

Mark's playing was very accomplished and very enjoyable to listen to. We would welcome him back at any time.

## JESUS IN THE OLD TESTAMENT

It's intriguing how often when reading or listening to some passage from the Old Testament we meet Jesus. For example, think of the story of the prophet Samuel, when sent to anoint as king over Israel the man God had chosen to replace King Saul. Samuel had been told the family (Jesse of Bethlehem), but not which one of the eight sons was God's choice. Samuel would have chosen the son that looked most promising in terms of physique, skill in combat etc. But God had chosen the youngest, the one everyone looked down on, the one assigned to the lowliest role in the family, looking after the family's flock of sheep. As God explained to Samuel. "For the Lord sees not as man sees: man looks on the outward appearance, but the Lord looks on the heart" (quoted in 1 Samuel 16:8).

And reading this we are immediately reminded of Jesus in the Gospels: Jesus Himself knew what was in man (as in John 2:25).

But, of course, finding Jesus in the pages of the Old Testament scriptures should not surprise us. This is precisely what Jesus told us to expect. After Jesus had been raised from death, He joined two of His disciples who were walking to the village of Emmaus. Afterwards they recalled how their hearts had burned within them as Jesus had taken them through an amazing tour of the scriptures, explaining how they pointed to Him, His coming as Christ and His death and resurrection.

Taking these words of Jesus as our guide, in our central Bible Study, we have begun to explore the Old Testament; in what way does what is written there point to Jesus? We have started by looking at the lives of some of the central figures, beginning with Abraham and Moses. We have now turned to King David.

David of course is a massive presence in the OT, and the story of his life, his brilliance and success forms a significant central pivot around which revolves the subsequent story of the kingdom that he established. He was poet and psalmist, tender lover, brilliant leader and military strategist, generous foe, stern dispenser of justice, loyal friend. But he was of course also human, with serious moral failings and weaknesses. Although under God, the leader of the people of Israel, David knew his limitations in fulfilling that role. The psalm that most exemplifies this is of course Psalm 51 "For I know my transgressions and my sin is ever before me".

Interestingly, his role in the gospel story is picked up immediately in the New Testament. As we turn to Matthew, the first of the gospels, in the very first verse Jesus is identified as the son, the descendant, of David.

And on the day of Pentecost, when Peter explains to the crowds the amazing event they are witnessing in Jerusalem, he emphasises not just that Jesus is a descendant of David, but the fact that David had eagerly looked forward to the coming perfect King, the Messiah, who would come to save His people.

As Peter said, David suffered the fate of all men: to die and to be buried. But David, inspired by the Spirit, had in faith looked ahead, in

expectation of the one who was to come, one of his descendants who "would not be abandoned to decay". David had spoken of the resurrection of Christ (see Acts 2:31). This was David's faith and hope. And as we know, and as Peter explained to the crowds on that day, this had all now been fulfilled in the life of Jesus. And thank God that is now our hope also.

Thank you very much for all who contributed to the work of The Mission to Seafarers on Sea Sunday. The splendid total of £294 was raised from the collection in Church and direct donations. Thanks you also to the knitters for the scarves, mittens and hats which will be much appreciated by the seafarers.

The Society helps not only merchant seafarers but also those who work on cruise ships. Recently Ruth Campbell, the Port Chaplain for London, has helped to set up a dedicated cruise crew lounge at Tilbury and mobilised a volunteer team to help her run it. This facility will be used by 8000 seafarers each year and approximately 200 crew members each time a cruise ship docks at Tilbury. It has already had an impact on crew morale and well being. One innovative addition was a communications pod allowing crew to speak to family and friends in privacy. It has been much appreciated. Crew said that there was a real lack of private space onboard the cruise ship so the simple act of being able to have a private conversation with their loved ones was one they greatly appreciated.

Throughout the world the Mission continues to give support wherever it is needed. The collapse of the Key Bridge in Baltimore halted port operations and left 159 seafarers stranded on eight ships who needed help with visa and shore pass renewals. In Richard's Bay, South Africa, the team prayed with two seafarers who ended up in adjacent beds on the same hospital ward after sustaining injuries on board separate ships. Their ministration included providing home-cooked meals, care packages, SIM cards and clothing.
